BZC resident Laurie Senauke oversees the program and is available to answer questions and receive input.

Sounding Board

Our Field of Practice

At the Board's recent retreat, we talked over several major areas of concern: prioritizing building repairs and remodels, managing finances, exploring technology needs, and sangha harmony. Since our monthly meetings must be very focused, it was good to be able to discuss these issues in a more open and expansive way.

One recurring theme throughout many of our discussions was the way that our relationships with each other at BZC are a main field of practice, particularly between us in our various and shifting BZC positions and roles. Participants in the fall 2013 HEAR council meetings reported both successful and unsuccessful encounters with the various ways differences and conflicts are handled at BZC, both formally and informally.

During the recent kitchen remodel, property managers fielded much commentary and questioning from sangha members; this makes sense, given that the community room kitchen and bathroom are among our very public areas. However, we thought it would be good if sangha members continue to develop awareness of the impact of our tone and our words on these volunteers who are donating a great deal of time to our community. Our sangha is fueled by tremendous volunteer efforts of many, many individuals. And neurologically we are all "like velcro for negative experiences and like teflon for positive." If we keep that in mind, we will make a point of expressing appreciation at least as much as our concerns and criticisms.

During the report back from the HEAR councils, the question emerged: When we find ourselves in conflict, how do we each decide between working out something either internally, directly with the person(s), or calling in additional resources? How can we collectively and individually increase our skills in these situations? Might the HEAR council, in addition to listening to concerns and issues brought to it, proactively sponsor further training for the sangha?

Over our 30+ years on Russell Street, we've developed many ways to balance the needs of our residents with the needs of the non-resident community, and this is an ongoing process. How

do we keep that process alive and healthy? What are the best ways to resolve conflicts around our limited space resources?

The retreat was an opportunity not so much to come up with action items, but to further process and digest issues that we feel are foundational to the well-being of our sangha jewel—stewardship of our physical plant, interpersonal harmony, and financial stability.

Doing the Next Thing and Then the Next Thing



Our refurbished kitchen is serving up oryoki meals again and fueling the many activities of our sangha.

While we enjoy this renovated space, we can turn our attention to other necessary repairs and upgrades to our buildings. The Project Management Committee maintains a list of all planned building improvements, categorized according to type (for example, efficiency, function, safety), projected cost, and priority, from low to urgent. Our buildings are aging and impermanent, so the list is extensive.

Composed of several board members and other sangha

members with experience caring for the buildings, the committee is in the process of identifying the priority items for 2014, bearing in mind that we have just finished a large project that drew substantially on sangha energy and resources. The current plan is to take on some of the smaller but high-priority projects on the list, such as refurbishing plumbing in 1929 (upstairs), replacing non-functioning windows in 1933 ½, and creating

some weatherized, secure, outdoor storage space on the community room porch.

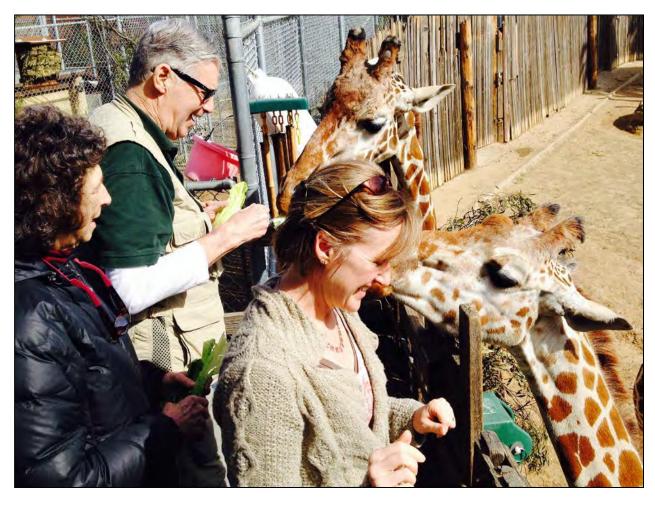
