

Class on the Mountains and Rivers Sutra

Dogen Zenji's *Sansuikyo* ("Mountains and Rivers Sutra," a.k.a. "Mountains and Waters Sutra") is an invitation into a realm where the world itself—the mountains, waters, plants, animals, and people we encounter every day—can be experienced as fully, luminously alive, dynamic, and responsive.

In this three-week class, led by Hondo Dave Rutschman, we will explore what happens if we try as hard as we can to take Dogen up on this generous invitation. To that end, we will experiment with group writing, exercises, and open-ended discussion. Our goal will be to enter these teachings from the inside, not so much as objects of intellectual study, but more as encouragements to enter an embodied joyful expression of awakening together.

Given the experiential nature of the class, it will be offered in-person only, on three Thursdays: August 21, August 28, and September 4, 7:15–8:45 p.m. in the Community Room. Please join us!

The suggested class fee is \$30, which is used to support BZC programs and to provide dana to the teacher. Any offering is accepted, and no fee is required for attendance.

Tassajara Sangha Work-Study Weeks

Every year Tassajara Zen Mountain Center, a monastery located in a remote part of the Ventana Wilderness east of Carmel Valley, provides an opportunity for sanghas to practice together as part of the Guest Practice Program during the summer guest season. Teachers from sanghas from the Suzuki Roshi lineage can bring a group of up to 10 members including the teachers.

There will be three groups from BZC attending this year: Ryushin Andrea Thach and Dave Rutschman will be leading the first group for the week of July 15–20; Susan Marvin and Ellen Webb will be leading the second group for the week of July 29–August 3; and Gerry Oliva and Mary Duryee will lead the third group for the week of September 2–7.

The daily program includes 5:50 a.m. zazen, 6:50 service, 7:15 soji (short work period), 7:30 breakfast with other guest students, 8:30–12:00 work assignments, and noon lunch with other students. The rest of the day will be structured by each study group, then we will join the guests for dinner and sit the final zazen period of the day.

The groups plan to drive down together if possible. If we can't drive all the way to Tassajara because of parking constraints, there is a stage from Jamesburg to the Center for \$65.00 round trip.

If you are interested in participating, please let the group leaders know as soon as possible. If you would like more information or are interested in participating, you can find contact information for all the teachers on the BZC website under the "Teachers" tab.

Board Nominations

The Board is the governing body of BZC, overseeing the organization's finances and its buildings and grounds, and setting the practice schedule in close consultation with senior teachers and the Practice Committee. Having an engaged, dynamic board is vital to the health and future of the organization. Please consider contributing to BZC by joining the Board or nominating someone you think would be an effective Board member—no previous experience required!

Board members attend about ten meetings a year (usually two hours on Sunday mornings), plus an all-day retreat in the first part of the year. They also serve on at least one working Board committee: Finance, Leadership, Buildings & Grounds, Development, or Recruitment & Elections. Board members may also assist the President and other officers on ad hoc projects. Board members can serve a maximum of two consecutive two-year terms.

The next election takes place in October and the new term starts in January 2026. The Board will present its nominees at the All-Sangha Meeting on Sunday, September 14. Nominations can also be made by sangha members at that meeting.

Awakening Together

We are so blessed to have such a strong community in Berkeley Zen Center. A community that comes together in mutual support time and time again, most recently to cocreate our 34th practice period and June sesshin, which, to quote the Lotus Sutra, was "Good in the beginning, good in the middle, and good in the end." Our study of the Lotus Sutra and Case 78 from the Blue Cliff Record, which was assigned to our shuso Mark as his case for the practice period, shared in common the theme of awakening together. The sixteen bodhisattvas all got in the water together and woke up together.

The Lotus Sutra says in chapter 2, "Only a buddha together with a buddha can fathom the ultimate reality of all things." In the shuso ceremony, the shuso makes the scripted statement that finishes with "Let us call forth the Dharma!" We call forth the Dharma together. We awaken together. Nobody can do it for us, and we can't do it alone. In these frankly frightening times in which we find ourselves, it is most incumbent upon us to give each other the gift of our true selves. We give each other the gift of non-fear. There is great strength in this community, and with our practice grounded in daily zazen and other activities of this temple, we are able to tap into this strength for ourselves and for each other. We discover capacities we never knew we had before, like finding a precious jewel sewed into a sleeve.

It is not for nothing that we call Buddha, Dharma, and Sangha the Triple Treasure. This is true wealth. A life worth living is something that money can't buy. And it's something we freely offer to each other in a web of mutuality and love. May our practice always continue like this.
