#### Come to the Zendo

Join us back in the zendo!

For the last several weeks, morning zazen at 6:00 a.m. has been open to members in person who have registered their vaccination and booster status. We sit for an hour, with a signal after 40 minutes, allowing people to stretch or change position. Zazen is followed by chanting service and a short period of temple cleaning. Given the uncertainty about the course of the pandemic in the coming months, we remain masked and socially distanced in the zendo. Despite these inconveniences, it has been a joyous and familiar pleasure to be back in the zendo together after more than two years.

On the week of May 2, BZC will reopen for public zazen at 5:40 p.m. each weekday, and a noon period on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Once again, we are maintaining our vaccination, masking, and seating protocols to minimize the risk of infection.

#### **Spring Practice Period**

Our annual spring practice period will begin with a one-day sitting on Saturday, May 7, and continue through a five-day sesshin and Shuso Ceremony on Sunday, June 12. Whether you are sitting in the zendo or at home, Abbot Hozan invites each of us to increase our commitment to practice for these five weeks, according to the demands of our work, family, and other obligations.

Hozan has asked Enzan Chotoku Gary Artim (*Round Mountain/Clear Genuine*) to be shuso. Nancy Suib will serve as benji, assisting the shuso throughout the practice period.

In our Soto Zen tradition, a new abbot's first practice period with a shuso is a kind of confirmation of his or her position. With our spring practice period Hozan takes this step.

There will be a Thursday evening class with Hozan, studying the classic Lotus Sutra parables (online only). At all events, due to our Covid protocols, in-person attendance will be limited, and the schedule is subject to change. The sesshins will be in a hybrid live and Zoom format. Because we are still working on new sanitation policies for food service, both the opening and closing sesshins are scheduled for 7:50 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. For the May 7 sesshin, inperson participants should bring a bag lunch. For the five-day sesshin, we are considering offering oryoki lunch for in-person attendees, so stay tuned! For a practice period calendar and online application, see the BZC website. Abbot Hozan will lead our one-day sesshin on Saturday, May 7, and our five-day sesshin on Wednesday through Sunday, June 8–12. Come and join the festivities of caring for our temple property. Whether you are here for part or the entire work day, all who enter through our gates reap the benefits of our efforts!


#### The Circle of Women Ancestors

#### Nominations for the BZC Board

Every year the sangha elects three of six members-at-large to two-year terms to the BZC Board. Board members may serve a maximum of two consecutive terms. Elections take place in October and the new term starts in January 2023. The Board will present its three nominees at the All-Sangha Potluck on Sunday evening, September 18. Other nominations can be made by sangha members at that meeting.

Some of the various skills the board seeks in nominees (not all in one person) are: oral and written communication, organization, information technology, money management, fundraising, engineering, building maintenance, and nonprofit law. Nominees should be members of BZC. Board members attend about ten Sunday morning meetings a year plus one all-day retreat in the first part of the year, and serve on at least one working Board committee: Finance; Buildings & Grounds; Development; Electronic Communication & Social Media; Archive; and Elections & Nominations.

#### **BZC and Climate Change**

In this issue and the next, our column will briefly summarize the IPCC Working Group III Sixth Assessment Report, which you may have heard about in the news.

That's a mouthful! First, let's demystify the terminology:

- The IPCC is the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, a UN body responsible for providing governments with scientific information to make climate policy. The IPCC issues Assessment Reports every 5 to 7 years, and just released their Sixth Assessment Report.
- Each Assessment Report has three working groups, which release their own sections of the overall report.
  Working Group III handles mitigation (what we can do to stop climate change), and released their report on April 4, 2022.

That report shows that our current mitigation policies will lead to a world that is over 3 degrees warmer than preindustrial average. This blows past a goal of 1.5 or 2 degrees of warming. We must reduce our emissions by 50% by 2030 to have a chance of staying well under 2 degrees, which is critical to human and ecosystem health. The good news is that we have the technology to do this! The time for action is now.

The report identifies a chief obstacle to action: a lack of political will made worse by corporations and lobbyists who act as impediments to real climate action. The biggest collective solutions we should be organizing toward are state and federal policies that:

- rapidly deploy wind and solar technologies,
- electrify transit,
- electrify buildings, and
- end fossil fuel subsidies and stop the extraction of fossil fuels.

The report highlights that the global richest 10% generate disproportionately more carbon emission than others, between 36 and 45% of all carbon emissions. (If you make over \$35,000/year or have assets worth more than \$12,000, you are a member of the richest 10%!) The report highlights actions the global rich should Avoid, Shift, and Improve:

- Avoid taking long-haul flights or regularly using a car;
- Shift to more public transit and fewer animal products; and
- Improve by using electrified heating, appliances, and cars.

Avoiding, shifting, and improving your habits in these ways, and then sharing this with your friends and neighbors is a great way to tie individual and collective action together.

# **Practice Period**

In Dogen Zenji's *Eihei Koroku* this is recorded: "Dogen held up his whisk, and with it drew a circle in the air. He said, 'Practice period goes beyond this.' "

For more than thirty years Berkeley Zen Center has offered a spring practice period. These were usually led by our founding teacher, Sojun Roshi. Now, as the new abbot of BZC, I am honored to lead this year's practice period, as we emerge from strange days of pandemic.

In the Zen tradition, the word used for practice period is *ango*, which means "peaceful abiding." In China and Japan this would be a three-month residential intensive, with its own root in the early Buddhist "rains retreat," when wandering monks and nuns would gather in monasteries during monsoon season.

Our practice period, in the springtime when the circle of life turns in joyous renewal, is an opportunity to rededicate ourselves to the practice of living an enlightened life, to renew our beginner's mind. Dogen Zenji speaks of "practice realization," meaning that our Zen practice does not so much aim toward a goal of awakening, but rather that our practice expresses the enlightenment that is always within and available to us. Practice period includes sitting, walking, chanting, cooking, serving, eating, working, resting—all of this is enlightened activity, woven into whole cloth by zazen.

BZC is not a monastery, so our members have jobs, families, and responsibilities outside the gate. Our practice is as much in our homes and in the world as in the zendo. This is our ongoing Dharma experiment—dedicated lay practice, sitting with everything. During practice period we have recommended requirements, but as Sojun Roshi said, "within these requirements each person can create his or her own schedule. This is the nature of lay practice. Some will be able to do only the minimum, while others who have the opportunity will be able to extend or stretch themselves much more."

We may wish to do it all, but each of us must be realistic about our capacity. The important thing for each of us—during practice period and throughout the year—is to clarify and set our practice intention, then do our best to keep to that intention. You don't have to break your bones to do practice period. But don't be slack with yourself either. With Right Effort our practice edge comes into view. What is the Middle Way? Whatever commitment and schedule one comes up with, we are all practicing together intimately.

Not everyone in the sangha will be able to clear the time and energy to participate in practice period. That is completely understandable, and everyone, of course, is welcome to come to the zendo when they can. All of us are supporting and being supported by the practice period—peaceful abiding. These weeks together can extend throughout the year. As Dogen says, "Practice period goes beyond this."
