Aspects of Practice 2022: Study of the Eightfold Path

This year our fall Aspects of Practice period will take place September 10 through October 9. The senior students will lead this intensive examination of the Eightfold Path, part of Buddha's Four Noble Truths and one of his earliest teachings. The Aspects of Practice period is a time to deepen our own personal practice and an opportunity to expand and enrich our sangha life together. We will consider how Dharma meets the world we find ourselves in and how we can open to the inevitable changes that are occurring in our time.

Aspects of Practice includes two sesshins (September 10 and October 9); a four-week series of Thursday night classes; and Saturday lectures on this theme. When you register, you will be asked to commit to practice in a way that harmonizes with your life. There is no right or wrong, but you are encouraged to make a commitment.

Many Communities, One Sangha

"Many Communities, One Sangha: Exploring the Realities of Equity and Inclusion" is a curriculum which guides an inquiry for us, in small groups, to articulate our values and explore our desires and ways to implement the goals we determine together. It is not a top-down training, but rather a grassroots program designed to help us decide together how we proceed. The principal teachers of the curriculum are Mushim Ikeda, Rhonda Magee, and Crystal Johnson, who many of you may know.

Rhonda Magee, one of the program's developers, will be providing experiential opportunities to acquire and practice the skills we have learned. Prof. Magee is also the author of *The Inner Work of Racial Justice: Healing Ourselves and Transforming Our Communities Through Mindfulness.* She is a Dharma Holder in the Soto tradition.

Participants must sign up **by September 15, 2022** and commit to two hours a month over 11 months. This will consist of five sessions of

videos, readings, and small, ongoing group discussions, alternating with five sessions with Rhonda Magee. We hope to have in-person meetings, without excluding those who are participating from a distance, through a hybrid option. The cost is \$150 per person, with scholarships and a sliding scale. Participation limit is 30 people (the number we can fit in-person in the zendo). If demand exceeds capacity, we will offer it again.


Lay Ordination

What Is a Good Life?

On three Monday evenings—November 7, 21, and 28, at 7:15 p.m.—BZC is pleased to host Shaykh Yassir Chadfly in dialogue with Abbot Hozan about "a good life" in our respective Sufi and Zen traditions. Yassir is a Sufi imam, born in Morocco, ministering to Bay Area Islamic communities for many years. From 2002 to 2017 he taught Islamic and Sufi studies at U.C. Berkeley's Graduate Theological Union. Yassir and Hozan have been good friends since

the 90s, sharing the music and wisdom of our spiritual paths. Yassir has visited and lectured at BZC several times. His warm-hearted presence is uplifting.

We can accommodate up to 30 people in the zendo itself and will be live-streaming on Zoom as well. The suggested class fee is \$30. For further information, contact Hozan or class coordinator Ryushin Andrea Thach.

Second Koan Class

Ryushin Andrea Thach, Ellen Webb, and Ron Nestor will present our second Zoom koan class on three Thursday evenings: October 20, October 27, and November 3. Classes will be at 7:15–8:45 p.m. All are welcome.

We'll be continuing with three cases from The Book of Serenity, the koan collection most closely associated with the spirit of Soto Zen. There's a subtlety and nuance in this collection that we've really enjoyed. We'll also be providing excellent commentaries from Yamada Koun on each of the three cases in online Word documents, including paper copies on the BZC bulletin board shelf for those without printers. Based on our first class series last year, we particularly enjoy the give and take of group discussion rather than a strict lecture format. What do these koans bring up for you? Where is there confusion? Also, after focusing on mainstream Buddhism during Aspects of Practice, it may be interesting to switch gears into a Zen context.

Cost for the series is \$30 or whatever you can afford. We'll be announcing the three cases we've picked and sending out the texts and commentaries as we get closer to the starting date, allowing ample time for study before we actually meet.

Sejiki—Feeding the Hungry Ghosts

On Saturday, October 29, BZC will again celebrate Sejiki, an annual ceremony from our Soto Zen tradition that we have missed during the pandemic. The morning program will include a short zendo talk by Hondo Dave Rutschman, followed by a joyous ceremony in the courtyard.

The outdoors altar will be filled with fruit, cakes, and other food offerings to entice spirits from the beyond and those present. Raucous noisemaking by children and adults will call forth hungry ghosts and the spirits of the departed. After offerings and chanting of the "Sutra of Opening the Gate of Sweet Dew," we will read the names and honor all those who have died this year.

Families and children are encouraged to participate. Since we have adapted the tradition to dovetail with the western tradition of Halloween, members and children are welcome to come in Halloween costumes. Noisemakers will be provided and you may also bring your own. The talk and ceremony will start in the zendo at 10:15 a.m. All are welcome to join the work circle at 7:45 a.m. to help set up the altar.



Three Aspects of Practice

Some years ago Sojun Roshi invited me to lead a fall practice intensive that we have come to call Aspects of Practice, which focuses on the basics of our Zen Buddhist tradition. With the partnership of senior students, we created this month-long program, which served well as a point of entry for newer students and as a kind of refresher for more experienced practitioners.

This fall's Aspects of Practice begins on September 10, continuing through October 9, led by Karen Sundheim and other practice leaders. Details can be found elsewhere in this newsletter. But in this space, I'd like to review three essential "aspects" of our dharma practice: daily zazen, meeting with a teacher, studying the Dharma.

When Suzuki Roshi came from Japan to be the priest at Sokoji, the Soto Zen temple in San Francisco, he established a practice of daily zazen that we maintain more than sixty years later. His disciple Sojun moved to Berkeley and followed much the same practice. As we have done for fifty years, BZC is open for sitting six days a week. We strongly encourage people to come to the zendo, sit together, and share a daily practice. Taking into account members' work and family lives, everyone cannot come to the zendo every day, but the doors are always open. Sitting side by side we sustain each other naturally, and we come to a wonderful intimacy of practice.

The Covid pandemic compelled us to create new modes of online zazen that are not our traditional body-to-body zendo practice. But Zoom has served us pretty well these last few years, even if it's not everyone's cup of tea. But now we are back in the zendo early mornings, afternoons, and Saturdays. I want to encourage you to resume our long-standing in-person practice. Join us. Those of us who have returned to BZC feel refreshed and encouraged again by the opportunity to sit zazen together. This is the shining heart of the Sangha treasure.

The second element of our practice is meeting with a teacher. When I came to BZC in the early 80s, there was an implicit expectation of meeting regularly with a teacher. Back then, our only teacher was Sojun, but in time, students' maturity and understanding have deepened. Now we have a roster of practice leaders and teachers who are available as guides, as mirrors, as dharma friends or *kalyanamitra*. This is the Buddha treasure. A teacher as Buddha reveals that you yourself are Buddha. A practice leader or teacher doesn't dispense wisdom or give out answers to our difficulties. She or he or they help us to stand on our own feet, to find our own inborn wisdom.

As abbot, I welcome the opportunity to meet with people—formally or informally. My dokusan signup for meeting face-to-face during morning zazen is just to the right of the zendo door. Studying the Dharma is the third treasure. In the broadest sense, zazen is our principal study. As Dogen Zenji writes in *Genjokoan*: "To study the buddha way is to study the self. To study the self is to forget the self. To forget the self is to be actualized by myriad things." In zazen, we sit still and allow the myriad things—which are the ever-changing elements of our "self"—to arise and to fall away. To complement this experiential study, we immerse ourselves in the teachings of Suzuki Roshi, Sojun Roshi, and our luminous ancestors in Japan, China, and India, going back to Shakyamuni Buddha. Their words and actions illuminate our own lives. During the upcoming Aspects of Practice, we'll explore the Buddha's Eightfold Path, a timeless map for living found in his very first teaching.

These three dimensions of practice create a whole, each including all the others. Each of us must find the right balance for the circumstances of our life. May the journey be complete.
